What is Citi Bike?



How to make 42rd St. even more entertaining.

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
- Citi Bike is New York City's bike share system
- A network of bicycle rental stations intended for point-to-point transportation

INTRAL

- Convenient for trips that are too far to walk, but too short for a taxi or the subway
- System operates 24/7
- Public-private partnership
- No city funds used

System Expansion

- As of spring 2016, system has:
 - 7,000 bicycles
 - 470 stations
- By end of 2016, system will have:
 - 10,000 bicycles
 - 600 stations
- By end of 2017, total size of Citi Bike system will be:
 - 12,000 bikes
 - 750 stations
- Phase 2 sets stage for future expansion in any direction



Creating a functional transportation option

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- Dense network of stations create a reliable transportation system
- Users are always a few blocks away from the nearest station

New "infill" stations added to system to help improve station density

CB 7 Final Plan

- Final Plan released July 2015
- 39 stations planned for Upper West Side
- CB 7 will receive additional stations to improve network



CB 7 Updated Final Plan

- Docks from existing stations will be reallocated to create new infill stations
- 6 infill stations planned for Upper West Side



Planning and Outreach

- Extensive participatory planning and outreach campaign conducted to select station locations in CB 7 including:
 - More than 20 meetings and events with CB, elected officials, area institutions, BIDs, and other community organizations
 - Public community planning workshops in April 2012 and January 2015
 - Draft Plan presentation in May 2015
 - Final Plan released in July 2015
 - New infill stations added for 2016 installation

Typical Station Locations

STATIONS IN ROADBED

Stations are typically located in the parking lane of the street, or on sidewalks that are wide enough to allow pedestrian flow




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
